John Lilburne and the Levellers (Classroom Activity) In December 1637 John Lilburne was arrested and charged with printing and circulating unlicensed books. On 13th February, 1638, he was found guilty and sentenced to be fined £500, whipped, pilloried and imprisoned.

John Lilburne (1614 - 29 August 1657), also known as Freeborn John, was an English political Leveller before, during and after the English Civil Wars 1642-1650. He coined the term " freeborn rights ", defining them as rights with which every human being is born, as opposed to rights bestowed by government or human law.

Lilburne's belief in democracy and male equality earned him and his followers the derogatory title of Levellers. And for these radical and controversial views, Lilburne was imprisoned seven times between 1645 and 1652. It is not surprising that Lilburne's views were welcomed by a disgruntled and weary Army.
