Long-term care is not limited to the elderly; in fact, 43% of individuals requiring long-term care are younger than the age of 65. The vast majority of long-term care recipients are older, however, with a projected seven out of ten people over the age of 65 requiring some form of long-term care services in their lifetime.

COVID-19 Guidance for Older Adults

Of the older population with long-term care needs in the community, about 30% (1.5 million persons) have substantial long-term care needs (three or more ADL limitations). Of these, about 25% are 85 and older and 70% report they are in fair to poor health. 6.
