The Vita Ædwardi Regis survives in one manuscript, written in folios 38 to 57 of the British Library Harley MS 526, these twenty folios measuring c. 13 cm by 18.5 c and penned in "brownish ink".

Written on the manuscript at a later date is the name of Richard Bancroft, Archbishop of Canterbury (1604–1610), who must therefore have acquired it.

Of all the chronicles covering the reign of King Richard II, the *Historia Vitae et Regni Ricardi Secundi* survives in the largest number of manuscripts, making it more popular than even Walsingham's histories.¹ Despite its obvious importance, the *Vita Ricardi*'s authorship has never been resolved and its narrative has been consistently characterized as little more than a popularized form of Walsingham or as "bitterly anti-Ricardian."² Nevertheless there is abundant evidence to support ...
